



Stigmatised





















Behavioral problems index Serious behavioral disorder (%)


Figure 3.9. Relative poverty rates: 1997-98 to 2020-21

Child wellbeing is better in more equal rich countries








Looking forward, looking back




- Childhood circumstances shape our lifelong wellbeing into adulthood and older age
- The role of the state in supporting people has evolved over time
- A changing context
- Today, in some ways, we've never had it so good
- In other ways, children born today will face new challenges
- And people working with children today face a different set of circumstances
- Leadership requires continuous learning
- You are not voiceless, choiceless or powerless

In the 1970s, the decade when I started work...

- Public services were built on hope and aspiration for a better society
- 1973-4 and 1975 Double-dip recession
- NHS and local government were being reorganised to promote integration
- Stigma in mental health
- Maria Colwell, six years old, endured neglect and cruelty before being beaten to death by her mother's boyfriend on 6 January 1973
- System seen as responsible







By the 1980s...

- 1980 recession
- 1983 the first Apple home computer
- Genetic scientists had mapped a genome of a small number of microbes
- Heidi Koseda died of starvation in 1984. Jasmine Beckford, aged four was beaten to death by her stepfather in the same year. Both households had dozens of visits months before death.
- Inquries recommended better information-sharing between professionals



By the 1990s...


- 1990 recession again lasting over a year
- 1998 Apple iMac home computer released
- More Inquiries into children's safeguarding





Moving into the 2000s and 2010s

- 2001 entire human genome mapped
- 2008 UK's deepest recession since WWII
- 2017 Apple released iPhone 8
- Victoria Climbié, aged eight, was tortured and murdered by her guardians in 2000
- Victoria's death led to a public inquiry headed by Lord Laming
- Baby P died in 2006, case review highlighted gaps
- Six years later, Poppi Worthington, sexually assaulted by her father before being asphyxiated
- This year, CQC's review 'Are we listening?' found fragmentation at every point


